'Sheila designed the website brilliantly,' says Ted proudly. 'It works really well because it's so logical.'



'A week ago, my parents decided that I couldn't watch TV for more than five hours a week. They think it's a bad influence on young people and that many programmes are too violent. Yesterday I wanted to watch a film, but my father told me to switch the television off. I was angry, but he told me not to argue with him. All my friends have got cable television, but I can't even watch ordinary television. It's so unfair!'

#### Vicki says:

'I understand why you're upset, Kathi, but there's more to life than television. Take up a hobby. Go to the cinema. Join a club. And please don't fight with your parents. That won't help matters."



Roberto from Brazil has got girlfriend problems. He says:

'My girlfriend and I don't talk anymore. Since she got her computer, she has done nothing but play computer games or surf the Net. The other day I asked her to come to a party, but she said that she was going to install new software on her computer. She told me to go by myself. I asked her not to be silly, and she told me not to interfere with her life. Should I break up with her?

'If you don't get on anymore, perhaps you should break up. But your girlfriend might be addicted to computers. Computers are essential, but it's a different matter when they take over your life. Talk to her about the problem, and encourage her to do other things. Maybe you can help her.'
